LOCK CHANGES

As has been indicated in previous electronic Updates and in the Newsletter, it is once again time to change the locks to the church. As most of us are aware, this is something that is done periodically for security reasons and was last done in 2008. The Parish Committee feels that it is prudent to change the locks at this time for many reasons - one being that our insurance company is encouraging us to do so due to the length of time since it has been done, together with the number of keys that have been distributed over the years, many to individuals who are no longer active in the Church. The number of keys is of greater concern since our staff has returned to the building at a time when security is an increasing concern in today's society. We love and care for our staff and members and continue to have safety as our priority.

The locks to the church will be changed on March 6, 2017. The Parish Committee has decided to continue with the key distribution guidelines that have been in place since 2008. Under these guidelines, PC members, chairs of committees, and staff will receive a key. Others who have regular business - volunteer or otherwise - at the church and demonstrate a need for a key, either temporary or long-term, may request one by completing the form below; and the Parish Committee will consider the request. As always, the members of the Parish Committee welcome questions and discussion. We will have the new keys here at the church on March 5.

JOIN THE CONVERSATION ON Sunday, March 5, at 11:45 a.m.: THE NEXT STEP ON CLIMATE JUSTICE



Can you feel a new undercurrent of energy pulsing in our congregation? From November through February, almost 30 percent of our church membership actively studied our responsibility for environment justice and climate change in a class called "Exploring Our Place in the Web of Life," led by Dan Hotchkiss and Kimberly French. The sheer number of people who committed to the five two-hour sessions as well as research homework is evidence of a movement happening here.

The class members did fantastic work. We went out into our community and interviewed town department heads and business owners to learn: How do we get energy, water, food, and waste removal in our towns? Where and who is harmed by our own resource use? There were plenty of things many of us had not realized. Two speakers—Chuck Collins of Institute of Policy Studies and Evan Seitz of UU Mass Action—inspired us with model stories of resilience and climate justice work, for example, at the Bedford and Jamaica Plain UU churches.

Now we'd like to invite the rest of the congregation to be part of this energy. How do we move from what we learned to local action and, at the same time, keep listening and learning about what is happening in our community? We have ideas and want to hear yours. Join us for a one-hour conversation at 11:45 a.m. on Sunday, March 5, in the Parish Hall. (The biweekly UU Faith in Action and On Topic groups will be joining us.) Bring a brown bag lunch.

I was looking for something new and different and was surprised to learn that the balladeer of Beatles fame had turned his energy into writing choral music. I do hope that you will come, and bring your friends.

March, miraculously, marks the end (sort of) of winter. On March 12, a women's ensemble from the choir will be singing "Water Under Snow" by a Finish composer. It's a hauntingly beautiful piece about the weariness of water under snow, with the resting grasses, waiting, holding tight. It's what we all do as we anticipate the first hints of early spring. Through March and April, we'll be looking at the life of Mohandas K. Gandhi.

In April 1921, John Haynes Holmes, Unitarian Minister and one of the founders of both the NAACP and the ACLU, preached a sermon called *Who Is the Greatest Man in the World?* The answer was Gandhi; and even in 1921, Holmes was able to recognize his greatness.

Our theme this year is Superheroes; and when I look at Gandhi's life, I can think of no other person who embodies our 7 superheroes and our principles quite so fully as Gandhi.

- He was a **Superman**, because he respected all people, even India's untouchables.
- He was a Justice Fighter, because he worked tirelessly against injustice wherever he found it.
- He was a **Heroic Hugger**, because he accepted all people and understood the importance of spiritual practices to grow our own self worth and strength.
- He was a **Truth Seeker**, drawing inspiration from many sources, including Christianity, Islam, Jainism and Hinduism. Indeed his first autobiography was entitled *The Story of My Experiments with Truth*.
- He was a Listener, because he struggled tirelessly for Indian independence. Each Monday was his "day of silence" so that he could train himself to better listen to others.
- He was a **Peacekeeper**, because he developed a system of non-violent resistance that inspired millions and proved that non-violence when applied correctly is more effective than violence in creating change.
- Finally, he was Web Man, because he lived a simple, frugal life in harmony with nature.

So as Unitarian Universalists, we have a lot we can learn from Gandhi and the example he set us.

I have a DVD copy of the Richard Attenborough film *Gandhi*, which would make good family viewing. If you wish to borrow it for a week, let me know.

'God is each other' 'Respect each other, value diversity and differences'

'God is the natural order of the world – the rules of nature (physics, biology etc.) The rest is up to us – to seek love, justice, wisdom and 'rightness''

'God is love and goodwill, acceptance, wisdom, strength and courage'

'God is everywhere. God is in the struggle, the climb, and the sweet feeling of accomplishment. God is smiles, laughter, tears, and the raised hands fighting for justice and equality. God can be found in each person. God is love'

'God is who I can thank for many, many things and the people around me''

'I don't believe in a God, but I think there is something out there that can't be seen nor touched, which helps us in extreme situations'

'God is a spark carried by each person. God is love' 'God is the connection. God is part of everyone'

'God is that which cherishes us. We reach for her, she is our foundation'

'Universe, Mystery, Force of Life' 'Love and Justice'

'Love is all there is' 'I feel God in nature's peace'

'I do not believe in a God as such. But perhaps I do in that I believe in the vitality and strength of the human spirit and in the vastness and glory of the universe, the importance and crucial role of every living thing'

MINUTES OF THE PARISH COMMITTEE MEETING January 18, 2017 (Approved February 15, 2017)

The meeting was called to order. Norm Grenier spoke to the PC about the financial and social importance of the 2/26 Service Auction, asking us all to encourage members to attend and donate. Those pre-registering via email to Norm G. or Valarie O. will be eligible to win door prizes.

The minutes of the December 21 PC meeting were accepted.

Cash in the Plate donations now agreed upon are: February - Heartwood Foundation, March - RE's Coming of Age kids to purchase backpacks for foster children, April - Youth Scholarships, May – Choir Music Scholarships.

The Treasurer's Report was presented. The Music Committee has changed its accounting process. All of its funds, expenses, and receipts are now submitted to the Treasurer to be deposited and/or paid and are part of the church's accounting. The Religious Exploration Committee continues to handle its funds, expenses, and receipts separately, using its own checkbook. Any concerns about this process will be addressed by the relevant committees.

The Religious Exploration Committee reported that attendance continues to be strong. A new structure is strengthening program flow, and space is being well utilized. RE Director Juliet will complete her RE credentialing this spring.

MAAC and Music Committee Reports were received.

Social Action Items: Social Action Network sent a request for space use. Barbara Bancroft will contact them for more information. Church members will participate in the 1/21 Boston Women's March for America. The Sanctuary Movement is seeking volunteers, space or donations to support their efforts. Note that the Plymouth County Sheriff's office has stated that they will be in full cooperation with I.C.E. The Social Witness Program sent a request for volunteers. The last two items will be sent to the Social Action Committee for consideration.

The Building and Grounds Committee reported that recent roof and ceiling repairs look good and are functioning well. Blinking light fixtures are being repaired and/or replaced. Bulbs are gradually being replaced with LEDs. A motion sensor light has been installed in the Ladies' Room. Rev. Sarah urgently requested that repairs and maintenance to the exterior of the building become top priority for the Committee.

The Sabbatical Task Group is comprised of four members. Gene Phillips, Sue St. Germain, Bob Waterman and Cheryl MacQueen are working on coverage for Rev. Sarah's sabbatical. A number of people have offered to cover the pulpit. The retired Rev. Gary Smith will be offering classes on preaching. Other ministers have agreed to cover rites of passage and similar requests.

A meeting of the Hospitality Committee is needed. Rev. Sarah will coordinate.

Church locks and keys will soon be changed. Members will be reminded via Newsletter, UU Updates and Order of Service. Chris Hoyle will provide explanatory notes for members' understanding of this difficult but critical change.

Finance/ Fundraising: Pam Davis and Bill Howe will draft a budget for FY 2018. On March 19 we will conduct a "Miracle Sunday" one-day pledge drive/stewardship event to support church operations. Rev. Sarah will work on program content. Holly will invite a group of members to participate in brainstorming for a piece to promote the event. The PC will handle follow-up on pledges.

The PC agreed to move forward with legal incorporation and pursuit of 501c3 status. Dan Hotchkiss and/or Atty. Linea Michael will facilitate these processes. The congregation will be asked to approve these items at the Annual Meeting. An extra Saturday PC meeting may be scheduled to address volunteer recruitment and other deferred items.

The next meeting of the PC will take place on Wednesday, February 15, at 6:00 p.m. The meeting was adjourned.
