#### Minister's Meditation

### On Leadership:

Once again, we had a great turnout for our April Question and Answer session. It was a little different this time, as I posed the question and you offered the answers! The question was: *What qualities make a good leader?* Here are your thoughts:

- [A board president] who has some goals in mind that delineate his or her own tenure.
- Clear and unambiguous about issues, but considers all sides before acting.
- Lives his or her involvement in church life. Is willing to be in a significant role and to set the tone, be a model.
- Gets to know people and figures out how to engage them.
- Clear about responsibility and impact of decisions on staff and vice-versa.
- Doesn't micromanage the affairs of the Congregation.
- Draws people along, acts strategically to make things happen.
- Leaders need to lead, not ask people what to do.
- Understands critical change in demographics. Makes room for different kinds of volunteering and opportunities for those with less time.
- Creates structure around decisionmaking and delegates authority where appropriate. When does the Congregation decide, when does the Parish Committee decide, when does a subgroup decide? Sometimes leaders can know in advance, sometimes can't. Discern the best process to make a decision.
- Connects decisions and goals to mission, purpose, cause, priorities.
- Reaches out to community to raise up our profile.

- Has caring but strong opinions.
- Nothing is set in stone.
- Is willing to start things, but doesn't necessarily have to finish them is inspirational but can let go.
- Bridge builders and catalysts who lead to action. Connect to wider community.
- Gives us opportunities to be effective in larger communities.
- Gets input from everyone with different perspectives and dreams; and offer a larger perspective from community and regional Unitarian Universalism.
- Facilitates decision-making; makes sure there's consensus.
- Tries to make sure everyone is heard; incorporates passionate voices and still moves forward.
- Doesn't have to be one style more than another; have different leaders with different styles and use them appropriately for circumstances.
- In touch with the Congregation, otherwise less effective.
- Receptive to feedback, provides an open channel.
- Moves the Congregation forward in a way that listens to people, and use what they learn in a way that will work.
- These are function and style issues.
   Function can be legislated more than style.
- Style is very individual, and we want as many different styles as possible.

As you look these over, I invite you to look inside yourself and see whether you demonstrate any of these qualities, or if you would like to develop them in yourself. We have a lot of leadership opportunities here and would enjoy giving you a chance to shine!

### **STEWARDSHIP PROGRESS**

On March 29, the congregation discussed <u>Draft Budget Take 1</u>. That draft laid out what people would like to have, and showed the price tag if we paid for everything from pledges. Next up, <u>Draft Budget Take 2</u> on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>May 17</u>, where we estimate how much we'll raise when our campaign is done, and make decisions. A few questions will guide this process: Which of our goals are so important that we must do them now, which are important but can be phased in over a few years, and which are less important? We are also using the following principles to guide our budget revisions: house our staff in a safe, comfortable and secure manner; work on maintaining our building; and compensate our staff fairly.

Twenty-two families have not yet pledged but will soon, we hope. A group session, for those who prefer it, is scheduled for **Sunday, May 3**.

### Chris's Comments

I was thinking about when I first came to UU Middleboro. After I had been here a few months, I realized that a lot of what I had been looking for when I arrived, and had found here, was a community. I love words and frequently use the dictionary to learn more about them. The definition I expected to find of "community" was there: a group of people having a religion, race, profession, or other particular characteristic in common: *Rhode Island's Japanese community* | the scientific community. The definition that got me thinking was further down in the list. It reads: joint ownership or liability: a commitment to the community of goods.

Many of us feel a strong sense of ownership for the church building. I recently heard **Sandy Smiley** speak eloquently of the wonderful spirit that fills the building and gives her (and me) such a feeling of peace. **Susie Sherman** and other members of the Building and Grounds Committee work to keep the building in usable, working condition. They spend time, energy and money to keep things running.

**Regina Gaudette**, continues to care for the beautiful woodwork as a tribute to her mother, **Elsie**, and because she, too, loves the building.

Others work to create a homey feeling. Many bring food.

We join together in worship in our beloved building on Sunday morning to lift up what we have or to receive what we need.

We are a Unitarian Universalist community, and the longer I am around UUs, the clearer it is to me what a wonderfully messy bunch we are. We may share many values and qualities, but we are certainly not easily categorized, and we demonstrate those values in a variety of ways. Some people think that caring for our building means not changing any part of it. Others think we need to make radical changes so the building can best serve the needs of the community that is currently using it.

Whatever you think this building does or does not need, the Parish Committee (the Society's board of directors) and I want to know about it. *Your voice does matter*. You will not be surprised to hear that even the Parish Committee is a messy community of UUs. What we do agree on is that we love UU Middleboro and that the community here is a special one. We continue to discuss, listen, state our cases, try to understand one another's perspectives and support one another and this community. We want what is best, and we continue to try to figure out just what that is. You can believe that we will take the time to find solutions that can be lived with so we can continue to incorporate the Seven Principles into our congregation and to always be creating 'better' community.

This summer, the UU Musicians Network (UUMN) Annual Conference will be held in BOSTON July 22 - 26. The first Musicians Network Conference was held in Boston 33 years ago, and before that it was REALLY, REALLY hard to figure out music for UU worship services. I know, because I was there! We are different from mainstream churches – our music does not follow a liturgical calendar year, many of us are reactive to music, we are picky about words, our desires range from organ to autoharp, and the list goes on. Finding support for UU music making used to be just plain hard.

In 33 years, the UUMN has become a mainstay of support, and our conferences have grown to resemble a mini-General Assembly: plenary sessions, workshops, worship, bookstore, recitals, three choral reading sessions, meetings galore, and even a banquet and talent night. We will be occupying three churches within a ten-minute walk of one another: Arlington Street Church, First Church Boston, and the neighboring First Lutheran Church. The choral clinician is Brainerd Blyden-Taylor, Founder and Artistic Director of the Nathaniel Dett Chorale (focusing on Afrocentric music) in Toronto. Songwriter and educator Joanne Hammil will be a presenter, plus many fine leaders for sessions on choral conducting, youth & children's music, keyboards, composition, and music program support. Clearly, this is a UU church musician's paradise!

During the month of May, the Sunday morning cash in the offertory plate will go toward professional development (summer studies) for choir members and other music volunteers, with the balance going to the minister's discretionary fund. Attending the UUMN Conference is just one of the enrichment possibilities – Stay tuned for more information next month!

### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION PROGRAM

On Easter Sunday the children made birdhouses out of 'off cuts' and leftover materials from **Mike McCarthy's** woodworking business. They look great, and we now have two wonderful birdhouses attached to trees and waiting

for new bird families. This activity was a perfect accompaniment to our Buried Treasure unit as we showed the children how to repurpose things by making something new out of something old.

The zipper broke on my son Matthew's school bag the other day; and I unthinkingly said, "Oh, we'll have to buy you a new bag." His reply was, "But Mum, we can repair it!"

Repurposing and Repairing are two of the 7Rs that we have been learning about over the last few weeks. When I was a child, repurposing and repairing were an everyday part of life. Goods were relatively more expensive, so it always made sense to darn socks, reheel shoes, and fix the vacuum cleaner. Now those skills are being lost as companies realized they didn't want you to repair things when they broke but buy new and ditch the old.



Our current economic model is to 'extract – produce – consume – dispose.' Unfortunately, this is unsustainable and is having a huge impact on the earth. The Adventurers have been looking at a different model, a circular model, a model where manufacturers take back the things they sell, recycle the materials and turn them into something new. 
