RELIGIOUS EDUCATION PROGRAM

On June 14 we had a wrap-up service for our Black Lives Matter unit. The children acted out the *The Sneetches* by Dr. Seuss, and I shared my 'real-life' take on the story called *White-Bellies, Black-Bellies: the story of America in Black and White*.

At the end of the service, we took some time to ponder what we had learned, and we shared these thoughts on post-it note stars that the children then stuck to a board at the front of the Sanctuary.
