


of us also follow our own personal traditions and may honor different deities or paths.

Monday, March 16 7:00 p.m. in the Parish Hall

The Wheel of the Year turns again as we welcome Ostara, the Vernal Equinox and one of the four great solar festivals. It represents sunrise, youth, the morning star, the element of Air and the direction of East.

The first lengthening rays of light begun at Imbolc have now grown in strength to a place of equality between day and night. From this point on, the sun will gain in strength as it climbs higher in the sky

until it reaches its zenith at summer solstice.

Ostara is the goddess of dawn, a maiden goddess who oversees the budding of plants and the fertility of the earth. The virgin goddess has awakened from her winter sleep and meets the young horned god. They will meet again at Beltane to consummate their relationship; but for now, they are innocent and delight in the beauty of nature coming alive once again.

Please join us as we celebrate this beautiful time of year. All are welcome. A potluck feast will follow the ritual.

We began with a presentation by Steve Larrett and Alan Melchior on the benefits of joining PayPal to accept credit/debit card payment for Church fundraising events. He explained that PayPal is easy to use and provides security and valuable tracking information. It costs 2.7% of the transaction plus 30 cents per card swipe.

Reports:

Minister: Please see Rev. Sarah's report. We will have two guest ministers next month. GA will be in Providence during the third week of June this year. Members may want to participate.

RE: Kelly Lownds reported on a successful youth overnight event. She is planning parent meetings, summer program, a wellness day fundraiser put on by youth, and curriculum for next year.

Treasurer: We had \$15,500 in income (good) and over budget expenses of \$5000 for repairs and \$5000 for UUA dues.

Building and Grounds: The ailing tree was removed before the windstorm happened.

Membership: Recent events were well attended. The committee is planning two events for spring - UU history and managing difficult conversations.

This program is designed for religious professionals and lay people to build collective practice for collective action. Spiritual leadership calls us to risk stretching beyond where we are comfortable, beyond what we think we are capable of in the name of love and justice. This kind of stretch is how our congregations reinvent themselves, adapt to new realities, advance mission, and renew our historic covenant. What risks are needed to pursue your mission, now? This workshop invites your team into a deeper awareness of the practice of faithful risking as part of Spiritual Leadership. Specifically, you will:

- Examine a theology of faithful risking as part of the faithful practice of Unitarian Universalism in congregations
- Explore some methods and tools for group discernment, and practice using at least one of them
- Reframe the discomfort that comes with stretching beyond our comfort zone as a positive sign of meaningful change
- Identify skills and tools for increasing our tolerance of discomfort, and practice using at least one of them
- Analyze case studies of UU congregations taking faithful risks.

Together we will consider how we can cultivate the courage to take the risks needed to truly live our congregational missions. **Registration ends on Monday, March 23, or maximum capacity.**
