Today, standing in solidarity with the Ukrainian people, we are humming a tune that is known as the State Anthem of Ukraine, sometimes called the Ukrainian National Anthem. The lyrics are a slightly modified version of the first stanza of a patriotic poem written in 1862 by the poet Paylo Chubynsky, from Kyiv. A western Ukrainian composer and priest, Mykhailo Verbytsky, wrote the music to accompany the text in 1863. The first choral performance of the piece was at the Ukraine Theatre in Kyiv in 1864.
