At birth, each of us begins our own unique journey through life. One of my most significant highlights was hiking through the mountains of Spain on a pilgrimage to the Cathedral of St. James, known as The Camino. Today provides me with the opportunity to share with you some of the truths I learned along the way.

July 2: General Assembly Service by Zoom Dan Hotchkiss and Jeff Giddings Join us for the largest annual gathering of UUs joining together in worship. The link will be posted.

At the end of the service, we will erect a display on the church lawn as a "silent witness" to commemorate recent local victims.

July 23: Transitions Join Sandy as she talks about how to move beyond the "getting used to" stage without actually moving to another place. She will explore how to plant roots rather than uprooting oneself.

**July 30:** The Baha'i Faith The Baha'i faith is a worldwide religion founded in the 19<sup>th</sup> century, though many have never heard of it. It took Liz many years to finally find a faith she could truly believe in.

CUUPS August 6: Lughnasadh Ritual at Soule Homestead (No service at the church) CUUPS will be celebrating Lughnasadh, or "First Harvest," at beautiful Soule Homestead, 40 Soule Street, Middleboro, from 9:00 – 10:00 a.m. We will gather in ritual to honor the land that continues to welcome us each year as well as other beings who live there. Come join us in ceremony, prayer, food and drink, dance the Elm Dance to honor the grand old tree that shaded our circle for many years, and offer up a living prayer for world peace. We will conclude with a Giveaway. You are invited to bring an item to share: from your garden, a local farmer, or a handmade offering from the heart. Join us as we come together to be held in the embrace of our beautiful Mother Earth. Note: If it is sunny, a hat and sunscreen are recommended.

August 13: Summer Sunday Potluck Breakfast Vi Fairweather and Tanya Trzeciak Join us for a Potluck Breakfast starting at 9:00 this morning. You will be invited to answer the guestion - When would be a good time to have a "Bring a Friend to Church" Sunday? What would we need to do in order for that to be a successful Sunday?

August 20: These two ways of knowing/being have been of importance, of concern, to Valerie since early childhood. She will be sharing some of the times and the ways in which she has floundered around with what has seemed to be a conundrum.

August 27: Quakerism, Meditation and Music **Barry & Patty Simon** Quakers, or Friends, have been attending services since the 1600s. During their meetings, there are periods of silence. Barry Simon will share with us what drew him to attend their services. He and Patty will also provide us with some meditative music.

September 3: United in Sona Susan Land Hotchkiss & Friends Susan Hotchkiss, Ed & Andrea Priest, and Bet Giddings will lead us in a reflection and singalong focused on the protest songs of the 1960's and '70's. The popular and powerful songs of that time celebrate community building and strength. Join us as we journey back into a world that looks surprisingly like the world we live in today.

# <u>A NOTE FROM THE MINISTER</u>

As I write this, the month of May is coming to a close and June is just a few days away. Our June worship services promise to be celebratory as we recognize the work of our Religious Exploration program, Pride Sunday and, of course, Celebration Sunday itself, before we move towards closing the books on the 2022-23 church year and the beginning of a well-planned series of summer services.

It's been quite a year! Remarkable, first of all, for a return to "in person" services for the first time in 2½ years. I can still vividly recall the sense of excitement as we all gathered together for our first worship service of the church year on September 11. It was a remarkable transition for me, as well, as I returned to the church that provided me an opportunity to serve as your first student intern minister. I had considered myself retired and was not searching for a church to serve, but when I learned that the interim position here was available, my interest was piqued immediately. As I've said to several of you, it's not often that an experience can be classified as unqualifiedly positive, but that describes my experience as your student intern minister and is what sparked my interest in serving you again-- twenty years after my first student intern Sunday.

The interim period is, by definition, a time of change, of transition. I met with as many of you as I could in small groups ("cottage meetings") in October and November, and learned how you first became interested in UU Middleboro, the things that you most value about membership, your history with the church and some of the things you hope for the future. These were informative and rewarding meetings. I learned of the great importance you place on the sense of community, spiritual community, you find here. I learned that a good many of our members found the church through events other that our Sunday worship services. I learned that you love our music program and that you greatly enjoy opportunities to gather socially-- at coffee hour, at yard sales, at musical events, at brunches, potluck get-togethers, and holiday fairs. And that Sunday sermons are helpful in your path of discernment as you, like all of us, continue on your spiritual journey. And that, while you love our RE program, you are concerned that there are not more children participating.

What I'm looking forward to in the second and final year of interim ministry: a deeply thoughtful look at the church's present mission statement with a view of sharpening its focus. As wonderful as is the text of the statement, its length and breadth hamper its effectiveness as a mission statement, which should be short enough to state in a sentence: the whole work of the church conforms to and grows out of a mission statement that is clear and concise and treasured by church members. Also, I look forward to the church investing in developing a social media presence that conveys the liveliness of our community, the variety of our offerings, and a range of opportunities for spiritual growth. Finally, I would like the Middleboro community to discover in us, not just a building that has anchored a corner across from the town hall for generations, but "A 21st century church with roots in the 19th century."

I hope you will all enjoy a restful and rejuvenating summer, and I look forward to our second year of working together to continue building a healthy and flourishing spiritual community.

#### **RE** Committee

We will be meeting at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 7, in person at the church and will also have a link if it is easier for people to join virtually. New members are welcome. The link will go out in UU Updates.

#### SOCIAL JUSTICE

The Social Justice Committee exists to facilitate our congregation making a concrete, substantial positive difference in our community. The Committee accomplishes this charge partially by sponsoring events that directly benefit the immediate community of Middleboro and its neighboring towns: over the past year we've conducted a letter-writing campaign to get out the vote for the November Congressional elections; each Saturday morning we hold a "Black Lives Matter" vigil on the church's front lawn; each month we direct Sundays' Cash-in-the-Plate to a non-profit organization that benefits citizens of our area of Massachusetts. We also donate to national and international organizations that provide services in areas of great need, such as currently in Ukraine.

The committee is finding that our church's social justice objectives can often be most effectively achieved by joining and supporting programs run by other local non-profit organizations. During 2022/23 we strengthened our on-going relationships with three of these, staffing and supporting the Bridgewater Communities for Civil Rights' (BCCR) Juneteenth program, participating in three Sustainable Middleboro events, as well as attending a breakfast and events of the Brockton Area Branch NAACP.

Much of our discussion and work this year has been directed at improving our process as a committee, speeding our ability to respond to requests and regularizing our processes for communicating with the congregation. With a HUGE assist from Dan Hotchkiss and great weekly cooperation and help from Valarie Ortelt, we now have a regularly updated page on the church website. Deanne Bonnar, Dody Adkins-Perry, and Lois Aldrich have developed on-going relationships with BCCR, Sustainable Middleboro, and the Brockton Area Branch NAACP, often attending their meetings and becoming friendly with their volunteers.

We have spent time discussing how much of our effort to spend generating programs ourselves for the congregation versus facilitating congregation members' interests. We believe we'll be most successful if we do some of both: we don't have the resources to put the weight of the church behind every interest of each congregation member but when we can, we can broaden the positive impact of our congregation members' social justice passions. We don't have the horses to do everything for everyone, but if we can't sponsor a program directly, we can still often assist or provide guidance and/or contacts for those wanting to become involved.

With our process improving, we're planning new initiatives over these coming months: Juneteenth celebration, a summer service presentation, a silent witness (domestic violence) exhibit, de-escalation training for the congregation next fall (what to do if there is hostile verbal or physical response at a vigil or protest), etc.

Current members of the Social Justice Team are Dody Adkins-Perry, Lois Aldrich, Deanne Bonnar, Bill Howe, Christine Hoyle, and Bob Waterman with Reverend Peter Connolly joining us. We hold Zoom meetings on alternating Thursdays.

- Music PC reviewed written report.
- Religious Exploration PC reviewed written report.
- Finance PC reviewed written summary.
- Building & Grounds Five windows downstairs are being replaced this week; decision on other five pending; we are waiting for estimates and more info on other priority projects; waiting for update on security system; Marc fixed loose board on back steps; work on ceiling over piano will be done in the summer.
- Social Justice Planning underway for domestic violence service and display in July; suggestion that a meeting be held for the Congregation to learn more and ask questions; will be referred to the Social Justice Team. Middleboro PrideFest scheduled for 6/24.
- Discussed an incident involving an individual who confronted a member of the Congregation about the rainbow flag. The individual believed an element of the flag represented pedophilia.
