Minister's Note

It's September, 2023, and the First Unitarian Universalist Society of Middleboro enters its 134th church year with a mixture of hope and anticipation. From all reports, our summer services were well-attended most weeks and succeeded in advancing the cause of our mission-- to provide a sanctuary where people can come together as a community to foster spiritual and personal growth through education and open discussion, offering the opportunity for meditation and worship, and serving as a liberal religious voice in Middleboro. Our "Celebration Sunday" in June recognized the many accomplishments of our church body, from providing quality pastoral care, responsible financial stewardship, engaging worship services, a deeply satisfying musical program, and active involvement in actions for social justice. Our members continue to step up to fill important institutional roles, and when we come together as a community, it is with exuberant welcome and a sense of good fellowship. So, we are justified in fostering hope for another successful church year.

The 2023-24 church year will be my last as your interim minister and certainly, we can expect an aura of anticipation during the course of the year as our ministerial search committee engages in its work. In preparation for call of a settled minister or the hiring of a contract minister (the committee will explain the difference, I'm sure), I anticipate that we will create and adopt a bond of covenant which will state clearly how we pledge to treat one another in good times and hard times and will do the work necessary to sharpen our mission statement, which has not been revised in twenty years. I expect that we will create an organizational chart which will clarify lines of responsibility and discernment in the work we do together as a valued institution and that we will continue to gather in joyful community.

In addition to sharing our joys and responsibilities, a significant task of the year will be to grieve together the loss of church leader and most recent recipient of the Elsie Gaudette Award for distinguished service, Bob Waterman, whose sudden death on July 15 left all of us in shock. As I write this, we still have not received notice of a cause of death and are not yet in a position to create a memorial service. Rest assured that we will honor Bob's memory and his life of service throughout the year and will do our best to shoulder together the many responsibilities Bob took on in service to the church. I hope that we will dedicate the coming church year to Bob's memory, honoring him by following his example of love in service.

I look forward to working with you all this year and look forward to our ongoing project of creating and sustaining a loving community.

The Elsie Gaudette Award was established in 1991 to honor Elsie and, in due time, any other members who exemplify her kind of work ethic and dedication to this congregation over time.

The person honored never had to be asked to do something – to work on a project, to come when needed, to take charge in a crisis, to provide goods and services without ever a thought wasted on receiving credit – just being the glue that holds us together. When Elsie was around, she was that force of nature that held the church together.

When the congregation was asked to nominate a person for this award this year, there seemed to be a groundswell of recognition for a person whose ears must have been burning as the letters of praise for one person poured in, a person who stood out as the glue during our modern crises as they kept coming. It will be hard to keep this person's identity secret in the litany of contributions made, as he stands head and shoulders above us all.

Since joining the church in 1997, he has made his presence obvious. He was reluctant for a long time to be outspoken in his support for our many projects and needs. The crisis of Covid-19 and its enormous effects on our congregation, services and personnel brought his leadership to the forefront. It brought him out of his quiet behind-the-scenes leadership style and into the forefront of the needs of this church. He saw solutions where others saw problems.

He has been a Parish Committee member, then Vice President, President and Acting Treasurer. He has been on the Fundraising Committee, Committee on Ministry, Governance and Policy Task Force, Leadership Development Committee, Spirituality Group, Staff Support Team, an Online Streaming Team member, Interim Ministerial Search Team member, Ministerial Search Team member, Silent Auction Manager, and Representative on the Board of the Matthew Mission Food Pantry producing the "Get Your Can to Church" campaign. Whew! He has led the Thursday Spirituality Group for many years, developing a style where everyone feels enriched by his presence and leadership. I've probably missed some things. Sorry.

Most recently, he has revitalized the Fundraising Committee, coming up with new events, and resurrecting the Public Relations/Publicity Team.

You never know where you'll see him! He might be the Sunday Worship Associate, giving us announcements and direction, working the sound or streaming service in the back, toting chairs, setting up tables, running wire, giving honest thoughtful advice, facilitating leadership, or maybe stepping in for the minister when illness keeps him at home, or just reaching something too high for anyone else to reach.

Through all his contributions, he has not neglected his wife, his children, his grandchildren, his home or his job. Many people wrote letters of praise and nominated him for this, our own UUnsung hero award. Please recognize our strong, silent, humble, tall leader.

DRUMMING WORKSHOP WITH SAM HOLMSTOCK

Sponsored by the Music Committee Sunday, October 1, at 3:00 p.m.

Join us for an exciting one-hour workshop on drumming presented by Sam Holmstock. Sam has been drumming for most of his life. He received his training at Berklee College of Music and is well known through Cape Cod drum circles as well as Drum Strategies for Healing. Sam will teach us a hybrid technique that combines African and AfroCuban styles. Participants can use any drum that sits on the floor and is high enough to go above the knees. That includes Djembes, Congas, Ashikos, Cajons, or 5–7-gallon buckets with Remo Rhythm Lids on them. Sam can work with most anything!

The workshop begins with basic hand technique for achieving various sounds that Sam works into basic rhythms. One by one, he will stack up rhythms to create the African drum ensemble experience of several rhythms being played at the same time. This can be called a drum-conversation. Sounds like a great experience! This workshop is free of charge, but donations (suggested \$10) are gratefully accepted.

Because we will have a limited enrollment, participants need to register and indicate if you need a drum for the workshop. Sam can bring buckets with Remo Rhythm lids. He has lots of them! FIRST UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST SOCIETY OF MIDDLEBORO MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING June 16, 2023

FUUSM's 2023 Annual Meeting was held in the Church Sanctuary on June 16, 2023. Twenty-four members attended the meeting.

The Congregation was notified of the meeting through FUUSM's *UU Updates* and the Church's website. Notice included a copy of the Warrant, the Church's Annual Reports for 2022-23, the Finance Report for 2022-23, and the proposed budget for the 2023-2024 Church year.

President Jim Bonnar called the meeting to order at 7:11 PM and provided a brief summary of the Annual Report. The Congregation then voted on the following Articles:

Article I: To accept the minutes from last year's Annual Meeting.

Motion to approve Article I made, seconded and passed.

Article II: To receive reports of the Society for the past year.

Bob Waterman highlighted the Congregation's generosity, as receipts for Cash in the Plate for the Church year totaled \$8,787.

Motion to approve Article II made, seconded and passed.

Article III: To recognize the gifts of time and talent given by members who are concluding roles in the Society.

<u>Discussion:</u> The Church expresses its deep appreciation and gratitude to the following individuals for their longtime service to the Church:

- Marc MacQueen, who served on the Parish Committee for the past 30 years as Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer.
- Linda Thompson, who served on the Music Committee for 33 years.
- John Mullen, who served as Chair of the Music Committee.
- Rick and Cindy Benard, who have supported the Church for many years and who have recently donated and had installed 5 windows for the church.

Article IV: To elect officers and members of the Parish Committee for the coming Church year (July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024): Vice-President, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, At-Large (two positions).

<u>Discussion:</u> Nominations for the 2023-2024 Church year are:

- Bob Waterman, Vice President
- Jeff Giddings, Assistant Treasurer
- Nicole Sykes, At Large (to serve a 2nd term)
- Stephen Larrett, At Large

The Parish Committee will continue its search for Treasurer. Please contact Jim or Bob if you know anyone who may be interested.

Motion to approve Article IV made, seconded, and passed.

Article V: To elect delegates (2) to the 2023-2024 General Assembly (GA) of the Unitarian Universalist Association, or authorize the Parish Committee to appoint these delegates.

<u>Discussion:</u> The Church is seeking two delegates to participate in the 2023-24 GA, which takes place June 21-25 in Pittsburg, PA in person or online. The Church covers the cost for delegates. The Minister is an automatic delegate, and Rev. Peter will be attending. Delegates must commit to attend all business sessions at GA and to participate in planning strategies for informing the congregation of actions and outcomes of the GA. Decisions will be made at the GA as to what the focus points of UU will be over the next few years.

A motion was made to authorize the PC to appoint delegates for 2023-24 GA, seconded, and passed.

Article VI: To adopt a budget for the coming fiscal year (July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024). Discussion:

- Marc MacQueen will be leaving his post as Assistant Treasurer at the end of June. He asked that members contact him directly if they have any questions as to where they stand regarding their pledges.
- Jim Bonnar and Bob Waterman provided highlights of the 2023-24 proposed budget:
- The budget is balanced, meaning there is no deficit projected. One of the reasons for this is that staff salaries are level-funded in the budget. This is a different approach from previous years and is focused on "living within our means." As much as we believe in continuing to move toward meeting the UUA standards for fair compensation for staff, we are also seeing challenges to our revenues. Although the number of pledges has increased for 2023-24, the total amount pledged is less than the amount budgeted. We also anticipate continued uncertainty in the investment market and a need to have sufficient resources to attract a new minister. This budget is an attempt to reflect the realities of who we are and what we have to work with.
 - Congregation members expressed concern with this new approach and would like to see some way to reward staff for all their work and dedication to the Church. Congregation members asked how this approach would address other pressing needs the Church may have.
 - The PC recommended that we use the surplus from this budget year to give staff a costof-living bonus. There was considerable discussion concerning the amount of bonus to give and whether other priorities should be considered as well. The PC will decide how the FY 2022/23 surplus will be allocated.
 - o Jim Bonnar suggested congregation concerns be addressed in Article VIII and asked congregation to vote on Article VI. After some discussion, the congregation agreed to vote on Article VI.

Motion to approve Article VI made, seconded, and passed.

Article VII: To authorize the Parish Committee or designee to withdraw from investment funds and/or borrow funds in order to manage cash flow and/or cover unanticipated expenses during the coming fiscal year.

Motion to approve Article VII made, seconded, and passed.

Article VIII: To address any other actions necessary for the business of the Society.

Motion to adjourn meeting at 8:30 p.m. was made, seconded and passed.

Annual Meeting: FUUSM's Annual Meeting was held on June 16, 2023, to discuss and vote on Articles I-VIII as described in the Warrant that was distributed in the *UU Updates* on June 4, 2023. Discussions centered around the proposed balanced budget for 2023-24, this year's budget surplus, and how surplus funds should be spent. Topics included fair compensation for staff; options for possible one-time bonuses; building accessibility; and overall physical needs of the building.
