Sunday, March 3 Jeff Giddings presenting Life in a Generous Universe

A Note from the Minister

My friends in South Central Kentucky have been posting pictures of flowers, crocuses and daffodils, on their social media pages for weeks now. Here in southeastern Massachusetts, we've been watching the snow melt ever so slowly over that same period of time. Now February has come to an end, and March holds the promise of Spring, a real Spring "with flowers and everything" as the youngest among us might say.

By the end of the month, Spring will have made real progress. There will be more light in the day each and every day, earlier sunrises and later sunsets. We will be encouraged to look toward the future. And that's a good thing because by the end of the month, too, we expect that we will know the name of the church's next minister; and that person and this church will begin the process of partnership, establishing priorities for the coming year and years to come, getting to know patterns, tendencies, preferences, and idiosyncrasies so as to establish a productive and mutually respectful relationship.

I still have four months to serve as your interim minister, and I hope that they, too, will be productive months. We've come a long way towards adopting a church covenant statement, one based on long held beliefs mostly captured in a different form, a lengthy mission statement from years past. We've made progress toward establishing an organizational chart which will give us all, especially newcomers, a way to understand who is responsible for what and which will encourage smoother operating procedures. The Parish Committee has been holding extra meetings over the past many months to learn more about how governance works in churches of various sizes. Dan Hotchkiss's book *Governance and Ministry* has been central in guiding that understanding.

The Public Relations Team has come together in an exciting way with Bet Giddings volunteering to be the point person for communication and "getting the word out" about our many interesting, enjoyable and exciting activities. Susan Hotchkiss has been very active in pulling together a night of jazz which will enliven our church in April-- as well as leading us in music and song each week throughout the year. The various committees responsible for the church's finances-- stewardship, investment, the treasurer, the pledge campaign coordinators-have been meeting together under the umbrella of the newly created Finance Committee.

Many things have come together to help us understand our various roles better and streamline our processes. And the Worship Committee has filled every slot for summer worship already! A bright Spring awaits! And then, Summer! Much to appreciate, much to anticipate, much to encourage our continued support of this multifaceted spiritual endeavor. Much to be grateful for.

On April 6, we have a unique opportunity to hear a world-class jazz concert right in our church! Our former music director, Jeannie Gagné, will be joined by Stan Strickland, Bruce Gertz, and Alberto Netto, all globe-trotting Berklee jazz artists.

Anticipating our jazz concert, I've been thinking about Leonard Bernstein's lectures to young people about music. He debunks the idea of "Classical Music" as static, long-haired, boring, or (worst yet) DEAD. He defines Classical Music as composed European music from about 1750 to 1820. Before that, historically, were Medieval, Renaissance, and Baroque music. After Classical were the Romantic, 20th and 21st century periods.

Bernstein calls this large body of music "Exact," because it is notated and preserved in history. We performers do our best to play Exact music just as it was written—to honor the composer and provide a bridge back through the centuries.

By contrast, Jazz—an American art form shared throughout the world—is sometimes written down, but it's hard to notate or read its highly complex syncopation. Most Jazz is loosely notated and not meant to be "exact." A performer will take a jazz tune and "riff" from it, creating something expansive and unique to the moment in which it is performed. A group of jazz players pass the solo spots around. The players improvise, and the audience applauds during the performance to appreciate the artistry of each soloist. Jazz is a very creative, complex, liberating art form!

On April 6, Jazz Music Night will start at 7:30 p.m., and we hope to pack the house for a rousing success! Tickets are available online through our website: www.uumiddleboro.org. Early-bird special is \$20 online through March 20, then \$25 online and \$30 at the door.

UU Middleboro presents "Jazz Music Night" on Saturday, April 6, at 7:30 p.m. The concert will take place in the Sanctuary featuring a Bostonarea jazz quartet headed up by Jeannie Gagné (piano and vocals) and Stan Strickland (sax, flute, and vocals). They will be joined by Bruce Gertz (bass) and Alberto Netto (drums/percussion). The performers are faculty at Berklee College of Music and experienced international performing artists.

The program features a broad collection of jazz music ranging from favorite standards to originals as well as classics drawn from more than 100 years of Jazz. These four talented performers are

putting together an evening to be remembered.

Our congregation's March Cash in the Plate (CIP) will be donated to Brockton based **Health Imperatives** that has as its mission "to improve the health and well-being of low-income, vulnerable people in Southeastern Massachusetts." Because March includes a fifth Sunday this year, the proceeds of the CIP that day (3/31) will be given to the Mashpee based **Native Land Conservancy**, a Native led land conservancy that is working to purchase additional land to expand the conservancy.


BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

PARISH COMMITTEE MEETING (Virtual) February 21, 2024

Meeting called to order by Jim Bonnar at 6:36 p.m.

Opening Words: Rev. Peter Connolly read the church's Mission Statement.

Go Around

Consent Agenda:

Meeting Minutes: Minutes from the 1/17/24 PC meeting were approved.

Reports:

Treasurer: Marc MacQueen informed the PC that he is having knee surgery on March 15 and may need help with some of the Treasurer duties for a few weeks. Jeff Giddings offered to work with Marc on this. Discussion of budget (see Discussion Agenda below).

Minister's Report: Rev. Peter Connolly distributed his report which PC approved.

Social Justice Report: The meeting minutes from the Social Justice Team (SJT) were forwarded to the PC for review. The SJT is asking for an update on signage, which had previously been a concern when the SJT was looking to set up a Peace Pole in the church yard. The SJT is seeking approval to work with the Middleboro Rotary Club to have a Peace Pole installed in the front yard. Discussion regarding whether or not the PC supports having a Peace Pole in the church yard, where it would be located, what it would look like, and what value having a Peace Pole brings to the church. The PC asked that the SJT provide a proposal to the PC that would respond to these concerns. Public Relations will also be consulted. Lois Aldrich will relay this request to the SJT at their next meeting.

Signage issue would typically be addressed by Public Relations (PR) and Building & Grounds. However, the lead of the B & G Committee has had health concerns and is not available to coordinate. The main issue has been the lack of visibility of the brown sign on the front lawn, especially at night. Solar lights can address this. Stephen Larrett said he has found a product with a single solar collector that can do the job. The PC approved the \$80 for Stephen to purchase the lighting as well as lumber to set it up. Stephen will work with Iim Bonnar, Alan Melchior, and PR to install the lighting.

RE: Kelly Lownds emailed her report to the PC. No issues reported.

Discussion Agenda:

Budget: The 2024-25 Budget submitted by Marc MacQueen and Jeff Giddings was reviewed and approved. Annual expenditures projected to be \$218,965. This amount includes 3% raise for staff, \$15,000 for major repairs (long term), and an increase of \$5,000 to the minister salary package. Minister salary for July is not included in the budget. Pledge goal as stated in budget is \approx \$187,000, an increase of 11% from this year's pledge goal.

Mailboxes: Susan Hotchkiss informed the PC that some people have been asking about their church mailboxes, which were dismantled during renovations. We have been moving away from mailboxes, especially because most communications are done via email. However, there may be some people who

could use mailboxes due to the nature of their work with the church (for example, Treasurer, PC President, Committee Chairs, etc.). Susan proposes using the double door closet on the Nickerson Ave. side with a container that would hold 12 mailboxes. Jim Bonnar offered to build a mailbox structure that would take less space. Who gets a mailbox would need to be determined. Treasurer will continue to get his mail in the Office Administrator's office, which is locked after hours.

Policies and Procedures:

Rental of Church Facilities Policy; Rental Fee Schedule: Rev. Peter asked the PC to approve the two policies, which incorporate comments previously made by the PC. The PC approved the revised policies.

Alcohol Use Policy: Stephen completed revisions to this policy, which were discussed and approved by the PC.

Parish Committee/Governance (Folder #2): Vi Fairweather provided a summary of her review of policies and procedures related to Parish Committee/Governance. As there are many policies listed in Folder #2, including some that do not exist but may need to be developed, Rev. Peter suggested that, for now, the PC review policies that are currently in place and need revisions. Vi agreed to put together policies that meet these criteria for review and discussion at the next in-person PC meeting (March 20).

One of the policies that will need to be addressed is related to the church's newsletter. The newsletter is currently made available to the congregation via *UU Updates* as well as being posted on the Church's website. In addition, the Office Administrator, Valarie Ortelt, prints hard copies of the newsletter and mails it to a handful of congregants. Given that Val's workload has increased considerably, the PC agreed to consider no longer mailing hard copies of the newsletter. The PC agreed to seek further input from the congregation on this matter in the near future.

Minister's Agenda:

Organizational Chart: The PC agreed to review the Organizational Chart at our next in-person PC meeting (March 20). Rev. Peter will email the most recent draft of the Organizational Chart to PC members prior to the meeting. All agreed it is important to have the chart finalized before a new minister is aboard.

Pledge Drive: Pledge goal for 2024-25 will be \approx \$187,000. Pledge team, including Stewards, is scheduled to meet Sunday, February 25, at 12:15 in Parish Hall to prepare for the drive, which kicks off on March 3.

Governance Meeting: The next Governance meeting is scheduled for March 6 at 6:30 p.m. in the Parish Hall. Jim will contact Dan Hotchkiss to see if he is available to attend the meeting to assist us in determining which policies mentioned in the appendix of his book would be most important for our church to develop and implement.

Going-Away Party for Rev. Peter: Vi Fairweather proposed that the congregation have a going- away party for Rev.
